1) Where are you working currently? What is your title?

I currently work as a marketing & communications specialist for the Allyn Family Foundation and Salt City Market.

2) Where did you go to college? What was your major?

I went to New York University and majored in media, culture, and communication with a minor in American Sign Language.

3) Were there any faculty members or classes that played a role in helping foster your interest in your current professional path?

I was able to find my voice while at MPH; my teachers and friends were incredible in that they gave me the space to be myself, no matter how silly or awkward that self was. High school is a really weird time, and I love that I'm able to look back with fond memories and know that I was able to be my most authentic self at such a tumultuous time.
