For the book reading:

All of these books should be available at the public library. You **DO NOT** need to purchase these titles. Be **prepared to discuss the books in class on the first day of school.** Here are some of the questions that can help you think about discussion points for the book.

- What is the main thesis of the book? How does the author(s) define the problem? What evidence do they cite to support their claims?
- As best you can determine, what is the author's perspective? How does the author's perspective impact the argument they are trying to make if it does at all?
- Who does the author think you are (the reader)? What assumptions do they make about the person reading the book?
- How does the book relate to issues involving International Affairs? What role, if any, is the UN playing currently to address the issues in the book?
- What ideas or scenes in the book, if any, resonate in your being? Why do you think this was the case?
- How can you connect what you read to today's events?
